- have a medical condition that **has** affected your ability to drive safely in the last five years.

The medical certificate must be issued by a New Zealand registered medical practitioner, who can be your usual doctor (GP), or a specialist if appropriate.

The medical certificate must be no more than 60 days old when you make this application.

What to bring

- Your completed application form.**
- Medical certificate completed by your medical practitioner** (if applicable, see medical certificate section on page 2).
- Your glasses or contact lenses if you wear them for driving.**
- Certificate of completion of course** (your D endorsement certificate must be no more than 60 days old).
- Evidence of identity** (must be original - no photocopies).
You must provide either:
 - your New Zealand photo driver licence (can be current or expired up to two years), or
 - your current New Zealand passport, or
 - your current overseas driver licence and your current overseas passport, or
 - your New Zealand birth certificate (issued on or after 1 January 1998) and a student ID card, 18+ card, power bill or bank statement*, or
 - another combination of acceptable evidence of identity documents* detailed on Factsheet 20: *Identification for driver licensing* or at www.nzta.govt.nz/identification.

*If neither document has a photo, you'll also need to provide a verified image (see Factsheet 20 for more information).

What to bring (continued)

- Evidence of name change** (must be original - no photocopies).
If you want to change the name on your driver licence, or if the name on your identity documents isn't the same as the name on your licence, you'll need to provide acceptable evidence of name change. This must be one of the following:
 - your marriage or civil union certificate
 - your dissolution of marriage or civil union order
 - a certificate of annulment
 - a deed poll certificate, change of name certificate, or birth certificate showing both names
 - a statutory declaration issued by Births, Deaths and Marriages confirming the name change.

Note: if your evidence of identity and name change documents don't provide a clear link to the name currently on your driver licence, you may be required to provide additional documentation.

Where to apply

Take your completed form and all **original** documents to any driver licensing agent. Go to www.nzta.govt.nz/agent to find an agent in your area.

A customer services representative will process your application, check your identification, may take your photograph and a sample signature for your licence as well as check your eyesight.

Eyesight

You must prove that your eyesight meets the required standard. To do this you can:

- present a satisfactory eyesight certificate issued by a New Zealand registered optometrist (this certificate must not be more than 60 days old)
- present a satisfactory medical certificate issued by a New Zealand registered medical practitioner (this certificate must not be more than 60 days old)
- pass an eyesight screening check at a driver licensing agent.

Note: the eyesight screening machines eliminate the need for many drivers to be tested by an optometrist or medical practitioner. However, if you do not pass this screening check then you must provide one of the above certificates before your new licence can be issued. Some drivers choose to provide a certificate instead of undertaking a screening check.

If you have sight in only one eye, or have only one eye (monocular vision) you must present an eyesight certificate from a doctor or optometrist.

Responsibilities

Driver licences make our roads safer for everyone and prove drivers are qualified and legally entitled to be behind the wheel. That's why it's important you always carry your licence with you when you drive.

Your address will be recorded on the Driver Licence Register. Please notify the Transport Agency immediately if your address changes.

Privacy information

The information requested is required to process an application for a driver licence. Collecting this information is required by Part 3 of the Land Transport (Driver Licensing) Rule 1999. Some of the particulars you provide will become part of the Driver Licence Register. Collection, dissemination and release of this information is authorised by the Land Transport Act 1998 and Part 11 of the Privacy Act 1993.

The Transport Agency may also use some of these particulars to provide you with information relating to driver licensing and driving, or to contact you for feedback on our services. We may also disclose some of the particulars to our agents and contractors in relation to the above purposes.

Under the Electoral Act 1993, s 263B, the Electoral Enrolment Centre operates an authorised information matching programme with the Transport Agency. The purpose of this programme is to assist in keeping the Electoral Roll up-to-date.

To keep the Driver Licence Register up-to-date the Transport Agency also operates an authorised information matching programme with Births, Deaths and Marriages. Please refer to the Privacy section of our website for more information.
