briefing notes - road safety issues

Selwyn District

New Zealand Transport Agency has prepared this road safety issues report. It is based on reported crash data and trends for the 2004-2008 period.

The intent of the report is to highlight the key road safety issues and be a resource to identify possible ways to reduce the number of road deaths and injuries in Selwyn District.

In each new report one year's data is added to a five year block and the oldest dropped so it is unlikely that the core issues would change radically from report to report.

The issues chosen for this report are drawn from either the most common crash types, those that appear over-represented when Selwyn District is compared to similar local bodies or those with high social cost (high numbers of fatal and serious crashes mainly).

We have included a brief overview of crashes in the district.

We encourage Selwyn District to delve deeper into the highlighted issues and other road safety issues in the district. Contact the NZTA Christchurch Performance Information team for additional information from the Ministry of Transport's Crash Analysis System (CAS). All data and maps in this note are from CAS.



Overview

In 2008 on local roads in Selwyn District there were 64 injury crashes and 84 non-injury crashes. In addition there were 43 injury crashes and 63 non-injury crashes on State Highways both as reported by the New Zealand Police.

The table below shows the number of injuries resulting from the 107 injury crashes by rural or urban areas (rural is defined as an area with a speed limit of 80km/h or more).

In 2008, all fatal crashes, 93 percent of serious injuries and 82 percent of minor injuries were sustained in crashes in rural areas of the district.

In 2007, the number of fatal crashes was the highest in the last ten years. In 2008 the number dropped to be the same as the previous low. Overall there is an upward trend in the total crash numbers. This is largely due to an increase in minor injury crashes.



Straight road -loss of control or head on

Between 2004 and 2008 thirty one percent of all injury crashes in Selwyn District were straight road loss of control or head on crashes. These 135 crashes resulted in 12 fatalities, 48 serious injuries and 137 minor injuries.

Most of these crashes occur when a driver loses control of their vehicle and either runs off the road or collides with another vehicle.

After drivers lose control their vehicles often crash into roadside hazards such as ditches, banks, poles or trees. Hitting these objects can result in a relatively minor off-road event turning into something far more serious.

The most common roadside hazards struck in injury crashes in Selwyn District were post or pole (33), fences (27), trees (18, and ditch (15) from a total of 126 objects struck.



- Most common crash type "off road to right"
- Most common at fault driver age group 30 to 39 years
- 23 percent of crashes involved alcohol
- 14 percent of crashes involved speed
- 18 percent involved "road factors"
- 14 percent involved fatigue
- 32 percent involved post or pole as an struck object
- 32 percent on wet or icy roads
- 45 percent at night
- Worst month April, October
- Worst day of week Friday, Sunday
- Worst time 3 pm to 6 pm

- 27 percent on wet or icy roads
- 36 percent at night

- Worst day of week Sunday
- Worst time period midday to 6 pm

Intersections

During the five year period 2004 to 2008 within Selwyn District there were a total of 364 crashes at intersections, 147 of these were injury crashes and 217 non-injury.

21 percent of these were in urban areas and 11 people were killed, 33 received serious injuries and 172 received minor injuries.

The most common crash type at intersections is when a two vehicles approaching an intersection at right angles to each other collide.

The main causes contributing to crashes described in Police reports were:

- Poor observation
- Failure to stop and give way

The next ten years—moving beyond Road Safety 2010

In August this year the Ministry of Transport (MoT) will embark on a nationwide road safety consultation programme as it moves to formulate priorities for the next ten years.

The chart on the right illustrates the progress made during the life of the Road Safety 2010 strategy and while progress has been made it would seem unlikely that the target of 300 or fewer fatalities will be met.
