Waitakere City

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New Zealand Transport Agency has prepared this road safety issues report. It is based on reported crash data and trends for the 2004-2008 period.

The intent of the report is to highlight the key road safety issues and be a resource to identify possible ways to reduce the number of road deaths and injuries in Waitakere City.

This report is the tenth road safety report for Waitakere City. All the material unless otherwise stated in this report applies only to local roads. Local roads are all non State Highway roads in the city.

In each new report one year's data is added to a five year block and the oldest dropped so it is unlikely that the core issues would change radically from report to report.

The issues chosen for this report are drawn from either the most common crash types, those that appear over-represented when Waitakere City is compared to similar local bodies or those with high social cost (high numbers of fatal and serious crashes mainly).

We have included a brief overview of crashes in the city.

We encourage Waitakere City to use its free access to the Ministry of Transport's Crash Analysis System (CAS) to delve deeper into the highlighted issues. All data and maps in this note are from CAS.

Overview

In 2008 on local roads in Waitakere City there were 379 injury crashes and 1258 non-injury crashes. In addition there were 61 injury crashes and 158 non-injury crashes on State Highways both as reported by the New Zealand Police.

The table below shows the number of injuries resulting from the 379 injury crashes by rural or urban areas for local roads (rural is defined as an area with a speed limit of 80km/h or more).

Over the past decade the total number of injury crashes in Waitakere have changed little. Fatal crashes have fluctuated with 2008 having the least fatals in the decade. However 2009 is already known to be a bad year with 13 fatalities (including those on State Highways) even before the end of June. Similarly serious and minor crashes show no firm trend.

On the other hand traffic volumes in the city have risen dramatically. On local roads for the 2003/4 year there were estimated to have been 698.7 million vehicle kilometres travelled (vkt) in the city, in 2007/8 this had risen to 964.3 million.

When Waitakere city is compared to similar cities crashes involving alcohol, speed, at night or at bends are all represented well above the average. Crashes on wet roads are also represented well above peer values.



Alcohol

Alcohol affects the way people drive. Studies show that the risk of being involved in a crash increases rapidly as a driver's blood alcohol level rises.

A driver over the legal limit (80mg of alcohol per 100ml of blood) is sixteen times more likely to be involved in a fatal crash than a sober driver.

Contrary to popular opinion, people with high blood alcohol levels are more likely to be injured or killed in a crash than a sober driver in the same crash, and if injured, they are also more likely to encounter complications in their recovery.

In New Zealand for the 12 months to December 2008, alcohol-affected drivers contributed to 34 percent of all fatal crashes (the same as 2007) and 15 percent of all injury crashes (the same as 2007).

In Waitakere City, alcohol was a factor in 33 percent of fatal and serious crashes and 17 percent of injury crashes in 2008.

(Open road is classified as any area with a speed limit of 80km/hr or more).

From the beginning of 2007 NZ Transport Agency has been adding driver factor codes to all non-injury crashes for the northern district.

This will allow the Police and other agencies to target alcohol related crashes more quickly and with even more geographic accuracy than ever before.

In 2008 there were 130 non-injury alcohol related crashes reported by the Police in the Waitakere City.

There are 10 sites with 3 or more alcohol related crashes between 2004 and 2008. Five of these had crashes in 2008 and these are shown in the following table.

The locations of alcohol related injury crashes occurring between 2004 and 2008 on local roads are shown on the map on the following page.



- Worst day Saturday, best Monday

- 86 percent of at fault drivers were male
- Most common crash type "off road to right"
- 28 percent urban
- 31 percent wet road
- 69 percent night time
- Worst three hour time period Midnight till 3am
- Worst month November, best September
- Worst days Saturday and Sunday (equal), best Monday



Speed

Nationally, speed is one of the major contributing factors to road crashes. Reducing speeds is an important road safety goal. Excessive speed increases the likelihood of a crash occurring by reducing the time available for drivers to respond to situations and it leads to more serious injuries. Research has shown that a one km/h reduction in mean speed can produce a three percent reduction in injury crashes.

Between 2004 and 2008 20 percent of injury crashes on local roads in Waitakere City involved travelling too fast for the conditions.

These crashes resulted in 14 fatalities, 76 serious injuries and 444 minor injuries.



- Most common crash type "Lost control turning right"
- 68 percent mid-block
- 40 percent wet road
- 54 percent night time
- Worst month April, best September and November (equal)
- Worst day Saturday, best Tuesday
- Worst three hour time period 3pm till 6pm

Further information about the 38 speed related injury crashes in Waitakere City on **State Highways** 2004 to 2008:

- No deaths, 6 serious injuries and 41 minor injuries
- Most common crash type "Lost control turning left"
- 76 percent mid-block
- 42 percent wet road
- 61 percent night time
- Worst months February and March, best January, April, July and November (equal)
- Worst day Saturday, best Thursday
- Worst three hour time period 9pm till midnight



Bend - loss of control or head on

Between 2004 and 2008 27 percent of all injury crashes in Waitakere City were loss of control or head on bends.

These crashes resulted in 14 fatalities, 105 serious injuries and 573 minor injuries.

After drivers lose control their vehicles often crash into roadside hazards such as ditches, banks, poles or trees. Hitting these objects can result in a relatively minor off-road event turning into something far more serious.

The most common roadside hazards struck in injury loss of control or head on crashes on bends in Waitakere City were cliffs or banks (64), trees (93), fences (69), posts or poles (81) and ditches (45) from a total of 513 objects struck.

- 14 deaths, 105 serious injuries and 573 minor injuries
- 80 percent of at fault drivers were male
- Most common at fault driver age group 15 -19 years (31 percent of all at fault drivers)
- 30 percent of crashes involved alcohol
- 52 percent of crashes involved speed too fast for the conditions
- Worst month January, best August and September
- Worst day Sunday, best Tuesday
- Worst three hour time period 3pm till 6pm

Further information about the 31 injury loss of control or head on crashes on bends on **State Highways** in Waitakere City 2004 to 2008:

- No deaths, 6 serious injuries and 34 minor injuries
- 79 percent of at fault drivers were male
- Most common at fault driver age group 20-24 years (29 percent of at fault drivers)
- 32 percent of crashes involved alcohol
- 35 percent of crashes involved speed too fast for the conditions
- Worst month November, best April
- Worst day Saturday, best Monday, Wednesday and Thursday (equal)
- Worst three hour time period midnight till
 3am and 6am till 9am (equal)

Night time crashes

Between 2004 and 2008 there were a total of 666 night time injury crashes on local roads. These resulted in 17 fatalities, 128 serious injuries and 776 minor injuries.

The proportion of fatal and serious crashes and all injury crashes occurring during the hours of darkness on local roads in Waitakere City is higher than the average for similar local bodies.


The next ten years—moving beyond Road Safety 2010
