

Travelling eastbound on State Highway 16 between the Rosebank Road on-ramp and Great North Road, you'll notice a significant area of reclamation on the seaward side of the motorway. That area – the Causeway – has had 10,000 wick drains installed to remove moisture from the deepest layers of the marine mud, and is being loaded with two to three metres of fill to weigh down the mud and squeeze the water out of it. During the next 12 months the compacting process will take place there and work will then begin to build new motorway lanes on top of it.



80km/h and detours

Reduced speed limits of 80km/h are in place for extended distances along the project, between Te Atatu and the Great North Road Interchange. That is the safest maximum speed with the narrowed lanes of the motorway while the works are taking place and it is being enforced by police, for everyone's safety.

Work is progressing on the motorway at night while traffic is lightest. There are signposted detours along local roads close to the motorway during the night works. The detours may add to your travel time. We appreciate your patience while we get the motorway upgrade job done.

Successful lizard release



A cluster of copper skinks or lizards similar to this one were uplifted from the works area near the Whau River Bridge and transferred at dawn on 1 November to a safe haven at Harbourview – Orangihina on the Te Atatu Peninsula. Matua Heta Tobin (Ngati Whatua) blessed the lizards both before they were uplifted from their original location and on their release. Matua Heta was joined by Causeway Alliance team members and Bioresearches' representatives who had assisted with the lizard trapping and release process.
